Positive Living

This is what the LORD Almighty, the God of Israel, says to those I carried into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: **“Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Marry and have sons and daughters ... Seek the prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the LORD for it for if it prospers, you too will prosper”**. Jeremiah 29: 4-8, NIV

These words are sent by Jeremiah as God’s message to His people in exile. They had been through trauma. They had lost everything: homes, belongings, livelihood, loved ones, their land. Everything was gone. They were now refugees in hostile territory. But Jeremiah’s letter is all about positive living in a situation that looks like disaster. What’s the advice? Get on with life! Start again with work, your family, your home! Don’t be moping around with regret. Make relationships, contribute energetically to your community, look to the future of your children, and work and pray for the land and the people where you are.

Then it goes on, ‘Don’t listen to those who say differently! God says, “I have plans for you – as a nation and as a people – plans for good and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope. Seventy years of exile are coming first. I haven’t forgotten you. It will happen. In the meantime, live positively where I’ve put you”’ (Jeremiah 29:8-11, my paraphrase). How can God’s people live positively in Babylon, in exile? They can do it because God has declared He has a purpose for them, and He has not forgotten them. They are God’s people, living on His promises. And they can be confident that God is in control and will bless them if they do as He commands.

We have the same God. He has made great promises to us. He promises us a future and a hope. We can be confident in our all-knowing and loving Father. We can take hold of His Word to us. We can live with the kind of deep-down peace He gives us as we trust Him. God spoke words of hope to the exiles. It was a word to cause them to lift their heads up high. I bet it wasn’t easy. But it would have been life changing. Here we are, right now, experiencing an international pandemic. All of us are affected by this. There has been tragedy and disappointment. For some it has been disaster, agonising loss, heartache, and pain. I believe that, in this situation, where we are, God would still speak to us those words of hope.

Theological Education and Leadership Training (TELT) Report

Council of Assembly established the Theological Education and Leadership Training Task Group in March 2019. This is a significant wide-ranging report looking at leadership formation across the PCANZ and has some significant recommendations for us to consider. The report is open to everyone to read and consider. Presbytery Council will be in touch regarding engaging people in this review process. Feedback should be sent to Presbytery by 21st August.

- Comments about the five streams identified in the executive summary and the direction outlined.
- Note any areas where the report is missing key information or omitted important material
- Detailed comments about the report

A Powerful Message by the Rev David Bryant. (an adapted Scottish resource but helpful advice to all)

It was one of those cold days when all you want to do is to huddle in front of the fire or heater. An icy wind and cold rain is coming in from the south, with long waves breaking on the beach. Well wrapped up, the writer decided to go out for a walk. "There won't be anybody out on a day like this". Wrong, right at the end were two fishermen sitting on chairs, drinking mugs of tea, warmly clothed, they seem to be thoroughly enjoying themselves, battling the elements. "How long have you been here?" "Since five o'clock this morning. if you want a good catch you're got to be patient", they replied.

It reminded the writer of an incident in St Matthew's gospel where the disciple Peter was having a discussion with Jesus about payment of taxes. Peter was clearly not very enthusiastic in paying the customary half shekel, looking for ways of avoiding paying. Then Jesus made a curious remark. "Go to the sea and cast a hook, and take the first fish that comes up, and when you open its mouth you will find a shekel. Take that and give it to them for Me and for yourself"

So what did Jesus mean? Some commentators think that Jesus was explaining to His disciples that the best way to pay tax was not to sit about dreaming, but to go and cast your net again and keep working until you reap your rewards. It was another way of saying, if you don't put something into life you won't get anything back. This is the same way with spiritual life. If we want to find peace and comfort we must spend time each week in quietness before God, even if only five minutes are set aside each day from our busy lives. Coming to church on a Sunday, gives us that opportunity, to share in a worship time with fellow parishioners.

What the writer believes Jesus was saying to Peter was; give generously of yourself in life and you will receive back love, friendship, happiness, and contentment. To put it another way, be kind, caring and compassionate and you may catch a fish with a gold coin in its mouth. A Powerful Message indeed.
