Hello Lord

On Wednesday this week, I decided to tidy the office room at St Andrew's, throw out time I thought. I found a book called Hello Lord....Ivor Bailey Speaking, first published 1975. Looking for a message for this week's bulletin, I opened the book up and the first line read... Hello Lord! Isn't sad how elections bring out the worst in people? When politicians campaign and make promises, everyone looks to see what they can get out of it.

Wages and loadings; education and employment; health and prices.

Why do we always look for our own selfish ends? Isn't more important that the greater number of people benefit - especially those who are not so well off - than that we selfishly get a few extra dollars in our pockets, or some extra advantage for ourselves. Lord, help us all to see - beyond petty, selfish ends, beyond electioneering stunts - our community needs, and the real issues involved, even if it costs us something.

Reading the back page, there is some information about Ivor Bailey. Ivor was born in England and achieved distinction in Australia and New Zealand as a preacher, chaplain and counsellor to prisoners, derelicts, and addicts. Also, a successful user of radio and television. Ivor was a minister at Durham Street Methodist Church, Christchurch, a weekly columnist for the Christchurch Star newspaper, front man in a programme called "Open Mind" and also a radio talk back host. During his ministry in Adelaide, South Australia, 1971 - 74, he began a daily, radio devotion on 5KA, "Hello Lord, this is Ivor Bailey Speaking", which quickly achieved a high reputation and wide audience. This book is adapted from those radio scripts. Here is another.

Hello Lord! I enjoyed talking to You every night, Lord. I tell You what's on my mind - the things that bug me, the people I meet, the challenges I face, questions I can't answer. We just chat together about things that matter.

Because You're my friend, I don't feel I have to dress up, or use outdated language. I can relax with You. Isn't that what prayer is all about, Lord? You and me sharing things we think are important. Thank you, Lord. ~Dorothy
