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2 Kings 6 1-7 The Miracle of the Axe Head

“6 Now the company of prophets ^[a] said to Elisha, “As you see, the place where we live under your charge is too small for us. ² Let us go to the Jordan, and let us collect logs there, one for each of us, and build a place there for us to live.” He answered, “Do so.” ³ Then one of them said, “Please come with your servants.” And he answered, “I will.” ⁴ So he went with them. When they came to the Jordan, they cut down trees. ⁵ But as one was felling a log, his axe head fell into the water; he cried out, “Alas, master! It was borrowed.” ⁶ Then the man of God said, “Where did it fall?” When he showed him the place, he cut off a stick, and threw it in there, and made the iron float. ⁷ He said, “Pick it up.” So, he reached out his hand and took it.”

Reading this text of Elisha, and the prophets who went to cut wood to extend their living quarters because they were growing in numbers is an interesting story. We find that not only do the prophets learn the written and oral teachings of ancient scriptures, but they also had to upkeep their living space and daily chores. As they went to cut wood, one student borrowed an axe to cut his log and, in the process, somehow, lost it in the water! He was stressed about it because it fell in an area that was very deep and there was an extraordinarily strong undercurrent. In that period, iron axes were a valued equipment and an essential tool for a man’s survival in the wilderness. It was the one thing that was used for most things of daily practical living and the one thing I suppose that made the difference between life and death when travelling in the wilderness. To have borrowed such an item would have meant that the person who gave it to the student fully trusted that he will return it just as he parted from it! The student was so upset that he asked Elisha to help him.

You might recall borrowing from someone because you needed it for a short time. The person that gave to you also knew that you needed, and it will help you just as it helped them. The man who gave it to the student knew that he was helping the young student build something good for his life. Sometimes we when can be careless with the things we borrow and sometimes do not bother to give it back. It might be a book, clothing, tools, money and etc. Sometimes having someone like an “Elisha” to help us retrieve what we borrowed can reminds us that someone gave us something that is of value to them to help us in our journey is not wasted or was not done in vain. There are those who have returned borrowed item that look a lot better than they received it from the owner or, returned it with an interest reflecting their appreciation for allowing them to use this valuable tool to better their lives.

Have you borrowed anything? Did you return it?
