Jesus at Large

Scripture Reading — Mark 15:40-16:8

“You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here.” . . .
They said nothing to anyone because they were afraid. — Mark 16:6,8

Some women watched from a distance as Jesus died on the cross. They had followed him for years and had “cared for his needs.” They loved him. They also saw Joseph take down Jesus’ body and wrap it in linen. They followed and saw Joseph lay Jesus in a tomb and then roll a stone across the entrance.

After the Sabbath they came back as soon as possible. They would care for him in death as they had in life. They were so intent they almost forgot about the stone blocking the tomb.

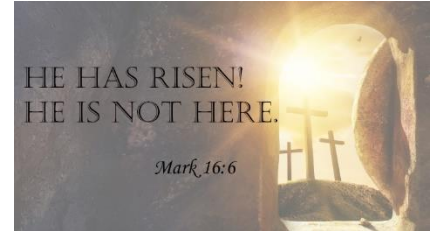
But when they arrived, they saw that the stone had been moved—and someone was in the tomb! “Don’t be alarmed,” said a young man dressed in white (an angel), but they had little time to be afraid of him. Jesus was missing! More accurately, Jesus had escaped.

The women did what anyone else would do in a tomb where a dead body had gotten up and walked away—they ran!

Every time we think we have Jesus figured out, Mark throws in a twist. That’s because Jesus never follows our rules. He’s powerful and unpredictable—and that’s unsettling to the way we would like to live. That’s why the authorities killed him. But that didn’t stop him either—then or now. Jesus is alive, and he could turn up at any moment, anywhere, and turn our world upside down.

Prayer: Dear Jesus, I have to admit there are times when you scare me. You change all of the things that need to change, and I’m scared to let some things go. Please be gentle and gracious as you change me. Amen.

Friday 2nd April | Good Friday Selected Reading; John 18:1 - 19:42; The Good Friday gospel is John's story of Jesus' trial and crucifixion.

The events of Good Friday reveal humanity at its worst and God at God's best. On Good Friday, we see vividly and dramatically the depths of human sin and rebellion against God, even to the point of our crucifying the Son of God who took on our flesh. Yet our worst act against God became God's greatest act on our behalf. And thus we call this Friday good.

Prayer; Lord Jesus, who for our sakes was born among us, took on our flesh, lived our life, this fateful Friday shows the length you would go to, to love us. You were willing, not only to teach us, to be an example to us, to guide us, but also to die for us. Words fail us on the day, eternal word of God. There is no word we can speak but thanks. No response except worship. Amen.



Sunday 4th April | Easter Sunday Selected Reading; Mark 16; 1 - 8. Although the women have come to the cemetery early in the morning expecting to find the body of Jesus entombed there, a young man in white proclaims to them, "Jesus is not here! He has gone before you to Galilee.

Jesus is raised from the dead and returns to Galilee, toward the out-of-the-way place that was the site for most of his ministry. When Jesus was raised, he went back home. If we would meet the resurrected Christ that is where we most likely will meet him: at home, amid the ordinary, everyday tasks of life, in a place like Galilee.
