Easter in Us

Selected reading Luke 24; 13 - 35 Luke tells the story of the walk to Emmaus when a couple of disciples are surprised by the Risen Christ.

Theme: When in our lives death and despair are defeated and life triumphs, then it can be said that Easter is in us, that the resurrection has extended its power over our daily lives.

Today's Scripture is the story of the road to Emmaus. It was told and remembered and cherished by the Christian community because they understood this story to be a great help in understanding Easter. This story deals with the question of how Easter gets to us and where we live. You know the story. Two relatively unknown followers of Jesus are trudging along the dusty road seven miles from Jerusalem to Emmaus when suddenly the Risen Christ joins them incognito on their journey. By the time they reach the end of their journey, they have moved from discouragement and despair to hope and renewed faith.

To the first readers of the gospels, the road to Emmaus was for them a symbol of the Christian life. One reason why we love this story is that it is so wonderfully believable and ordinary.

It is a story about ordinary despair, and ordinary, Monday - morning drudgery. It is a story about a journey, about meeting a stranger, about sitting down at a table, and sharing a meal. It's a story about Easter among us.

The resurrection has a way of penetrating down deep into everyday life. It is the means whereby we are enabled to see the world, not as this place of death, decay, and defeat, but as the place awaiting, groaning toward God's final victory. Emmaus is wherever in your life journey, as you are waiting along the way, either at church, or in a nursing home, or at a family dinner table, where you meet the Risen Christ and Easter comes to dwell in you.
