A historic church which has stood steadfast at Pleasant Valley for more than 160 years came close to being engulfed by rising floodwaters. “The water was right up to the door, but we don’t think it was inside the church,” Reverend Tony Kippax said of St Anne's Church. The heritage-listed church, which was built in 1863, is one of the oldest churches in Canterbury. That history counted for nothing when the nearby Temuka River flooded. Kippax said it was one of a number of close calls around Geraldine.
